# Jan Vikas Samii - An overview......



Jan Vikas Samii (JVS) is the Social Welfare Wing of Varanasi Province of the Indian Missionary Society (IMS). Currently it has 12 centers situated in Remote Rural areas of four States of North India namely Bihar, Utar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh.

The major thrust of JVS is to bring structural change in the society in favour of the poor and the marginalized through community based organizaions (CBOs). JVS believes that the strength of the poor is in their number and if our country is to have an integrated development, it can happen only through the collecive eforts of the

# Mission

Empowerment of the marginalized people of the society, especially the Dalits, Women and Children through a process of awareness, organizaion collecive acions and advocacy for raising their Socio-Poliical, Educaional, Economic, Health Status and Promoion of Environment.





# **Women Empowerment**

Women are one of the strategic focus groups of the organisaion because the organisaion envisages a gender -just society. JVS focuses on gender equality and women's empowerment as human rights. To eliminate all discriminaion and all forms of violence against women and the girl children we form women organizations, Self Help Groups (SHG) to strengthen the partnership of women within the civil society. Savings and credit provisions in itself are assumed to contribute to a process of individual economic empowerment through enabling women to decide about savings and credit use. It is assumed that women will then invest in their own economic acivity, either agricultural producion or micro enterprise, thus increasing incomes which they themselves will be able to control. Women's economic empowerment is then assumed to lead to increased wellbeing for them-selves and their families. Under the animaion program of JVS, formaion and credit linkages of SHG becomes one of the important programme. The total number of SHGs as on 31st March 2014 is 318. During the course of ime, JVS emphasized quality in terms of SHG formaion, an intensive and various training programme were organized for the animators to equip them with necessary skills and informaion. About 100 women of diferent groups have started the income generation program on their own.

## International Women's Day Celebration-2014

To honor and highlight the important role women play in the human society, Jan Vikas Samiti celebrated the International Women's day with the United Nations theme, "Inspiring Change", on 9th March 2014 at the premises of Jan Vikas Samiti.. Approximately 2300 women from various Self Help Groups and nearby villages, a number of Government and Non-Government officials, local Pradhans (Head of Village Councils) etc, participated in the event. Prerana Kala Manch awoke the spirits of the audience with a stage play on 'Ganga ho ya Gaangee'. The play focuses on the exploitation of women in the society. A series of colourful programmes were per-formed by the girls from Bhusaula, Bhitari and a dandiya dance by staff of JVS.

#### International Day for Girl Child –2013

Along with the Diocese of Varanasi Social Welfare Society, JVS co partned in organizing the Girl Child Day Celebration (Balika Diwas) on 12th October, 2013."Empowering girls, ensuring their human rights and addressing the discrimination and violence they face are essential to progress of the whole human family. The various issues that girls face in their daily life and how these could be overcome were brought forth.



# Income Generaion Aciviies (IGAs)

The organizaion promotes economic empowerment of its focus groups through the mediums of SHGs, micro savings/credit and micro enterprises. At the end of the reporing period, 302 SHGs existed with a strength of 4832 members from the marginalized communiles. The number includes the SHGs promoted by with the support of Manos Unidas. The cumulaive pool created by these members at the end of the reporing period was Rs. 6819421/ -This pool is a result of the micro savings developed among focus women over the years. The togetherness and habit of saving not only saved an amount for the members but also enitled them for hassle -free loan at their doorsteps. In order to save the focus women from the clutches of the moneylenders; the organizaion promotes producive as well as consumpion loan. A total of 2908751 SHG members took producive loan. The producive loan was used for se ng up micro enterprises for enhancing family income.

This is worth menioning that such works have been mainly responsible for making the poor a vicim of usurious pracices of the moneylenders. But in the changed scenario, the members are not only enitled to sot loan but their vulnerability is also minimized to a large extent.

The micro enterprises set up with the help of SHGs are mainly tea shops, bangle shops, thela, rickshaw, poultry, vegetable culivaion, general store and animal husbandry. At the end of the reporting period, there were a total of 62 micro enterprises exising in the focus area.

Naionalized banks like SBI, Central Bank, Allahabad Bank, Indian Overseas Bank, Punjab Naional Bank have been supporing the SHGs with insituional linkages and seed money. The associaion with esteemed banks has been a supporive factor for the SHGs as well as for the organisaion. From ime to ime, the capacity of the SHGs was enhanced with the help of training programs that included topics ranging from micro enterprises to group management and record keeping. It is very encouraging to see that the SHG members are contribuing to their small savings without any failure despite their poverty. Today these groups, known as Self Help Groups, have become the vehicle of change for the poor and marginalized.

# **Mass Awareness and Development Communication**



#### Awareness Programmes

The street play team of Jan Vikas Samítí has been very active in spreading awareness in the villages in the districts of Varanasi, Lakkimpur-Kheri and Mirzapur. They have travelled miles and miles to empower the women and to conscientize them towards chasing away the discrimination in the society at all levels through their plays. The street play team has been very successful in strengthening the women who are being tortured and used as a machine at home. After such awareness programmes being conducted through SHG groups the women raised voice against violence against women and have succeeded to get their rights at home and in the society.

The organizaion has earned a name for itself for adoping and pracicing a unique modus-operandi for conveying the development messages to the rural communiies. This includes a tradiional yet very entertaining method like puppet shows and street plays. The range also includes observance of signiicant days and rallies. The organisaion has prepared a team of street plays and of puppeteers. The groups move in the focus area of the parent organisaion as well as of the like -minded organisaions. The presentaions are always followed by a healthy and lively discussion with the audience in order to enhance the impact of the message given through the mediums. During the reporing period, a total of 87 puppet shows were held while the number of street plays was 92. The messages on the topics like sanitaion, maternal and neonatal health, Panchayai raj, government programs, etc. Apart from these mediums, signiicant days were also observed at community level with

а twin-objecive making of the community aware and enhancing its capacity to organise and manage community level events. The village level funcion received cooperaion from leaders, local Panchayat representaives, edu-



caional insituions, CBOs and other stakeholders. The aristes of Jan Vikas Samii perform street plays in the districts of Shahjahanpur, Varanasi and Mirzapur.

# Village Development Commitees (VDC)

Since a majority of the villages in the country sill face constrains such as ac -cess to educaion, health faciliies, drinking water, power, roads, credit, informaion and market, JVS has iniiated and has introduced VDCs. It prepares villages especially in back-ward regions by preparing Village Development Programme with the intenion of ensuring a holisic and integrated development of the village concerned. The main objecive of VDC is to focus on inancial inclusion and also to develop the selected village in an integrated manner. This would include economic development, infrastructure development, and other aspects of human develop-ment i.e., educaion, health, drinking water supply etc in collaboraion with the Nodal Agency (NGO) and other governmental departments. The VDCs facilitate the villagers to reach and have access to the schemes of the government and other inancial assistance etc. for their economic development. The VDCs are formed out of the Representaives from SHGs, Farmer's groups, CBOs and Youth Groups. We are implemening VDC programmes at Saharsha

# **Children's Parliament**

The organization is an ardent advocate of child rights because children form the future of a nation. In order to protect and promote children's rights and build up a 'child-friendly' environment, the organisation has been promoting the children's club and children's parliament. The main purpose these are to make children aware of their rights, especially to bring them as a group and to encourage them to mingle with everyone and interact with the others. During the meeings they

discuss on various issues, value them and take decisions to act accordingly. Thus the children come to know various things about what is happening around them. We have conducted 6 Children's Parliament meeings in which 264 children took part acively. Among them 170 boys and 94 girls took part.



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# **Community Based Rehabilitaion of Persons with Disabiliies**

#### Parent's Meeting

Parents along with their children actively participated in the meeting. The main objective of the meeting is to review the progress and achievements in the children's academic and extracurricular activities for last three months. The parents were explained about the Govt. schemes and how to avail benefit out of them, the role of DPD for the betterment of the persons with disabilities and tips on home based therapy and its importance.

The community based rehabilitaion programme of JVS has a focus on working in partnership with the parents and families of the children with disability to design and implement a unique plan for each child. These are drawn up as per the needs, abiliies of the child, family's expectaions etc. These intervenions seek to address parents' and families' low levels of awareness, misinformaion, litle or no aspiraions for their children with disabilii es. Parents and families are oriented, trained and built up their capacity alongside the child's, so that they can carry on the work with their children

## Parent's group

Parents of children with disabiliies are part of JVS's work. Apart from regular home visit and meeings with the parents, we are also creaing opportuniies throughsome aciviies where they can all work as groups.






## **Coordination of Partners**

SANKALPA 2014 - Naional level Para -Olympics was held on 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>, 2014 at St. Xavier's School, Jawalakhel, Nepal. The programme Sankalpa-2014 aimed to serve as a plaform provider for various children and adults with disabiliies to explore the unique talents that they possess. JVS-LF in collaboraion with St. Xavier's School has organized this event. Many children with disabiliies from diferent NGOs have paricipated in it. The winners were given prizes at the closing ceremony on the last day of the event.



# Comprehensíve Eye Health Servíces

#### Vision Centre

JVS established a well-equipped Vision Centre at JVS, for follow up and referral and Refracion purposes. Through this Vision Centre the nearby paients are coming for follow up and referral purposes whereas the persons ideniied refracive errors are prescribed spectacles as the requirement.

648 people came to have their eye checkup among which 20 persons underwent cataract operaion and 79 people are using spectacles. The old and the poor people of this area are beneiing from the Vision Centre.



## Community Meeting

JVS organized community level meeing to aware the community people about eye health care aciviies and Rehabilitaion aciviies for the disable people specially, for the People with visually impaired. The ield staf gave informaion about prevenive measures of the blindness, curaive and causes of blindness as very essenial component of the program. They also highlighted the rehabilitaion components to understand the concept of disable people's equal paricipaion in the all -round development of their livelihood.

The comprehensive Eye Health Service programme was iniiated by JVS in Pindra block of Varanasi District with the aim that no one should be needlessly blind and those with irreversible blindness or low vision should have the same rights and access in the society.

The programme mainly focused on the inclusion of people with visual impairment (VI) in social, economic and other developmental aciviies of the area,

#### Economic Rehabilitation of Persons with Visual Impairment (PVI)

JVS iniiates to train the persons with Visual Impairments to strengthen them for their self-dependency and earn their daily living through self-employments. Persons with visual impairment are trained under diferent small scale businesses like, running pety shops, making Garlands and handicrats etc.

#### **Mobility & Orientation**

Orientaion and mobility trainings (O & M) help visually impaired persons to know where he is in space and where he wants to go (orientaion). It also helps him to be able to carry out a plan to get there (mobility). Through orientaion and mobility trainings we focus on the aspects of sensory awareness: gaining informaion about the world through hearing, smell and touch, special concepts: realizing that objects exist even if not heard or felt, and understanding the relaionships which exist between objects in the independent movement: which includes crawling, rolling, walking, etc. sighted guide: using another person to aid in travel, protecive techniques: speciic skills which provide added protecion in unfamiliar areas, cane skills: use of various cane techniques to clear one's path or to locate objects along the way. We do also take care of their areas like daily living skills, bathing, brushing, keeping themselves neat and idy, managing household aciviies especially for the women.

#### **Formation of Blind Peoples Organization**

The Blind People's Organizaion (BPO) is an organizaion in the society which promotes comprehensive rehabilitaion of persons with all categories of disabiliies through educaion, training, employment, community based rehabilita-

# Residential Skill Development Programme for Persons with Visual Impairment (PVI)

JVS conducted regular residential training programme for visually impaired children to help them to fasten their reading and writing in Braille, improve orientation and mobility, skill development, and overall development of the children in their studies and social life. Girls learned cutting vegetables as well as other kitchen related domestic works. They learned how to identify and clean their clothes and also and bathing, dressing, going to the toilet, and other things which are necessary in everyday life. The children also got the chance to sing, dance and use musical instruments. This program helped them to develop taste for singing and playing musical instruments, especially drummer, harmonium, symbols etc.

ion, integrated educaion, human resource development and other innovaive means.

Other aciviies of BPO ensure that people with disabiliies are to iniiate to obtain the maximum service from the government and get access to the schemes and programme of the government. JVS promotes the formaion of BPOs in the villages to strengthen the people with visual impairment to take necessary need based iniiaives to approach and raise voice for their rights for their own welfare and development





### **Diagnostic Eye camps**

JVS regularly conducts Diagnosic Eye camps in the villages to idenify the people with low vision and blindness so as to provide the further assistance for the treatment and medicaion to ensure the eye health of the community. The ideniied Persons with low vision are referred to the Hospitals for further necessary treatments and counteract operaions.

#### **School screenings**

School screenings are conducted on a regular basis for the primary schools of the area covered by the programme to idenify the low vision and other eye disease of the children to provide proper treatment for them to overcome the problems to ensure the eye health of the children.

# Educational Initiatives



## **Day Care Centre**

'Muskaan' (Smile) school is an educaional iniiaive by JVS to ensure easy, afordable and appropriate educaional access and social development of the most marginalized children with muliple disabiliies (CwDs).

The very nomenclature, Muskaan, stands to inculcate the feeling of posiivity and to convey the message that Smile is a right of every child despite its disability. Disability can be turned into ability with eforts, dedicaion and posiive a tudes. The centre stands to take care of both physical and social aspects of the mainstreaming of CwDs. These include physiotherapy, medical aid, socializaion training, joyful learning,



# Inclusive Education For the low vision and visual impaired children

The main purpose of Inclusive educaion is to include children with Low Vision or Visual Impairment into mainstream of the society. Special teachers are appointed by JVS to support the children with visual impairment and low vision in their academic studies, paricipaion in socio/ co curricular aciviies etc. We disincively cover Harahua and Pindra Block of Varanasi district under this programme.

## Integrated School in Bhitari

Keeping the vision of the society every effort is made to have inclusive community at our end. To include one of the most marginalized groups in society i.e. children with disabilities is a great success for both the St. Joseph and JVS. We have been preparing this school for many months by conducting orientation programmes for teachers, parents of disabled children and others.





# Elementary Education to slum children in Varanasi city for a Self-Reliant Community

There is a great need to ofer elementary educaion to the slum children in order to inculcate certain discipline in the community although it will be a big challenge to make these children atend regular classes. This is a challenge because the parents do not show any kind of interest in educaing their children as their immediate concern is their daily bread. However, a few of the slum dwellers have expressed the need of edu-

caion for their children. The Educaional Program, therefore, has the following moto: *"Promote elementary educaion, put an end to the child labour ."* Children of 20 slums in Varanasi city are covered under the present programme for educaion.

## A Campaign on Education for All "Ring the Bell"

Jan Vikas Samii organized a campaign —RING THE BELL (educaion for all) in order to raise awareness about the fact that children with a disability also have the right to go to school. This is stated in the UN Convenion on the Rights of the Child (aricle 23 focuses on children with a disability) and also Millennium Goal 2 focuses on school accessibility for all children by 2015. Since Educaion for all has been declared into Part III – Fundamental Rights of Indian Consituion, but there are number of children who are not going to school due to disabiliies, lack of awareness and various barriers which exist in the society. The staf of JVS went to 15 elementary Government schools in the area of MURDAHA, PUAARIPUR, BHITARI, PUARI KHURD, CHANDAPUR and PINDRA and asked the children to make noise for a minute as loud as possible through diferent mediums. The campaign was successfully organized in diferent schools ater the morning assem-

bly. The teachers gathered all the children in the school playground with bells, trumpets, placards, pan lids, posters and they made a lot of noise. The children have paricipated in the campaign with full zest asking for the right to educaion for all including children with disabiliies.



# Educational Initiatives



# Abacus initiation for the village children

"Gramin Jagat Shikshan Sahayog" Educaional fund is a special iniiaive taken by JVS to ensure the higher educaion of the poor children in the operaional area of the or-

ganizaion by building awareness on educaion of the poor children and moivate the families to save an educaional fund for future higher studies of their children. 100 children were enrolled under the programme from the most vulnerable families of the area. Here we salute Bro. Rajesh IMS for his selless service despite his problems with his own eye sight.

#### Early Childhood Care Centers (ECCC)

Ten centers are established in ten villages of Kumar Khand Block of Madhepura District, Bihar to take care of the children in the age group of 3 to 5 years. Along with providing the basic nutriional essenials we adopt play way methods to prepare them for schooling, regular medical checkup during the health camps to ensure the good health of the children and occupy them with cultural aciviies like songs, dances etc. Teachers and Care takers of the centers provide regular building programmes to ensure and increase their self-e ciency to manage the centers and help the children to grow. Teachers use the joyful method of teaching which is interacive, paricipatory and understandable to the children.

Periodical parents meeings are organized to ensure the paricipaion of the parents in the programme and their children's growth. Besides taking care of the children in

the ECC centers, the teachers also took iniiaive to enroll the grown up children at the government schools in the beginning of the academic year. New children were enrolled in the ECC centers in place of those who got admission in the government schools. We also used the medium of street play to spread the message on importance of educaion which atracted a large crowd.



## Vocaional Training programmes for the Youth

Empowerment of the ciizens of tomorrow i.e. the youth is an important issue of JVS. The organisaion considers this powerful segment of society as a plaform of collecive acion and a pressure group. It has been promoing the empowerment of these focus groups through diferent ways and means. The irst and foremost task in this direction is formaion of the groups in order to pool the collecive energy. From ime to ime, these groups are sensiised and capacitated on the issues of health, educaion, responsibility for their villages, access to government programs, etc. At the end of the reporing period, JVS joined hands with AURO SPINNING MILLS, Himachal Pradesh a vocaional training centre for the future of these youth. They are being trained for 6 months ater which they are given placement according to their standards. So far 91 boys are sent for the vocaional training in which 64 boys are given job and the rest 27 boys are undergoing the training.

# **Health care and Promotion**



## **Community Health Program**

"Community health" is a process of enabling people to exercise collecively their responsibility for their own health and to demand good health as their right. It involves the increasing of the individuals, families, communies, organizaions, opportuniies, knowledge, skills and supporive structures that make health possible. JVS is working in 32 slums of Varanasi for the health issues of slum dwellers. Through

Associations for the SocialMarginalizedIntegrated Therapeuic Acion (Asmita) each slum has roughly800 to 1000 inhabitants.

The components of community health acion include.

- Integraing curaive with prevenive, promoive and rehabilitaive aciviies.
- Involving local, indigenous health knowledge, resources and personnel.
- Training for the village based health workers.
- Iniiaing and supporing organizaions in all aspects of health planning and management.
- Generaing community support by mobilizing inancial resources, labour skills and man power resources from the community etc.

## Special Awareness on Tuberculosis (TB)

The primary objecive of this acivity is to go to the door -step of marginalized and vulnerable communities to inform them about TB, its symptoms, diagnosis, treatment, and RNTCP (Revised Naional Tuberculosis Control Programme) services and how to avail these services in case of need. In the process, we link the ideniied TB symptomaic to RNTCP services by referring them and/or collecing and trans-



poring the sputum samples to the nearest DMC (Designated Microscopy Centre). If they are found to be having TB then they will be linked to RNTCP treatment services The place where JVS serves people in the ield of TB is as follows:

- Slum areas
- Tribal Populaion and homeless people

• In pockets or in communities where smoking and or alcoholism is high

The areas are very far away from DMCs/ RNTCP services (Distance to DMC is more than 10 kms.).

# **Organization Development**

#### **Capacity Building**

Organisaion's capacity was enhanced through training of the staf as well as the focus groups. The staf of the organisaion atended number of training programs that were either organised by JVS or by fellow organisaions/funding agencies. During the year a wide variety of creaive methods were employed to build capacity of the target group at various levels. Number of training Programmes, workshops, seminars and other innovaive methods been organized in diferent units with the objecive to enhance the capacity and to strengthen the knowledge on Issues that are afecing us. Trainings on Disability related issues, Child rights, women issues, mother's trainings, Self-Help Group to the unit staf for implementaion of the work in the ield more e ciently and efecively.

Ms. Munna Devi, a mother of four children is very thankful to the Swpna Swayam Sahayata Samuh(SHG) for the imely help she got to open a Pe shop in her village located at block Kumar Khand Block, Madhepura district Bihar. The SHG was formed by the women of this village in the year 2009 under the aegis of JVS. Since this group was registered in the Swarna Jayani Gram Swarojgar yojana it got Rs. 25000.00 from the bank out of which Rs. 10000 was without interest and Rs. 15000 was given at 10% interest. Being the member of this group she could avail a loan of Rs. 4000.00 in the year 2010 for opening the pe shop and out of the earnings from the shop, she fully paid back regularly the loan amount with interest. The needs of her six family members are met absolutely from the income of the shop. Moreover in the year 2013 she was able to conduct the wedding ceremony of her daughter. She and her family members are very happy to have the pe shop. This was something impossible through individual eforts.

#### Hand pumps made functional

In Bhathpoorvakal village, Harhuwa block of Varanasi district, for the safe drinking water hand pumps were not installed even ater repeated reminder to the authoriies and the available water resources had not been funcioning properly for a long ime. Neither the women nor the children had been ge ng enough safe drinking water. When members of the SHGs came to know about this, they discussed the mater and took a resoluion to raise a voice against it. They approach the concerned commitee member of the village twice and requested them to mend their ways. Having seen no response from councilors, the SHG members met the Pradhan and apprised him of the situaion. The Pradhan promised to look into the mater. He kept his words and instructed the concerned authoriies to install the hand pumps to have safe drinking water. The collecivism worked and since then it has been working properly with regular maintenance.



## Visual impairment not a barrier for transformation

The story is about the courage of Pooja, D/o Babulal, village Chamaru, Pindra block, Varanasi. Having no sight, she as a student she went through a lot of sufering, pain of losing friends, studies and even the love of parents. The school children called her blind, she was humiliated and they made fun of her. His father worked as a daily wage laborer. Many of the nights she had to sleep outside her house. She was very much dis-

couraged and had a miserable helpless life. During this ime the animators of JVS enrolled her in the SSI programme and it was a turning point in her life. The programme helped her to change her a tudes towards the circumstances and he began responding to posiively. Now blessed with a beauiful voice she sings and is paricipaing in every acivity. She took her visual impairment in a posiive way. Day ater day the staf used to discuss with her and encourage her. This helped to develop his knowledge and he started to love and obey his parents. Now she is going to school and is also interested in cooking and doing every household acivity and is dearly loved by her parents too. The regular counseling and interacion from the staf taught her to face the pain and fear and perform beter in his life. Now there is a transformaion in her life and she is equipping himself to face the challenges of life.




