Since its inception, JVS has been working for the integral development of the marginalized and underprivileged sections of the society, including women, children and persons with disabilities. JVS implements programs on Community Based Inclusive Development, Women Empowerment, Promotion of Community Health, WASH, Livelihood, Skill Development, etc. Over the years, JVS has been engaged in creating an inclusive society by enabling access to education, skill development and rights.

MAJOR IMPACTS

This year was a tough test of persistence and resilience for all of us. In these adverse times, JVS tried its best to retain all its endeavours which directly benefitted children with disabilities, adolescent girls and women from grassroots communities. In these efforts, we did create very significant positive impacts within the community, contributing to their economic and social empowerment. Below listed are a few of the community impacts that JVS created during the year 2020-21;

Within our 'Community Mobilization for Safe Motherhood' initiative, we organized 36 Health check-up camps in 26 Villages of Varanasi benefitting 2,851 adolescent girls, pregnant women, lactating mothers and senior citizens.

Through our 'Inclusive Development of Children and Youth with Disabilities' (IDCYD) initiative, we reached out to 5,760 children and youngsters with disabilities, 3,719 parents/caregivers and 2,214 others, such as teachers, health workers, government officials etc. 755 children with locomotor disability were enrolled for physiotherapy service and 1,021 for occupational therapy, 20 children had their successful corrective surgeries and 265 were supported for aids and appliances like wheelchair/tricycle, orthotic/prosthetic, hearing device and other mobility devices.

Our 'Tele-Rehabilitation project 'Sambhav' served 622 children with locomotor and neurological disabilities this year and has emerged as a centre of excellence to provide a wide range of services, including online consultation, virtual education on disability and inclusion, real-time parent guidance and assistive devices prescription. In our efforts to build the capacities of organizations working in the disability and rehabilitation sector, we organized 10 training camps and workshops on identification, diagnosis, basic therapeutic intervention, etc. for 381 community level workers.

Within our 'Promoting Inclusive Livelihood Opportunities through Grassroots Community Mobilization' initiative, we developed the skills of 394 women members of the SHGs, who are now engaged in different entrepreneurial activities. We established 2 Boutiques cum production units, one each in Varanasi and Jaunpur districts, U.P., which employ 34 women entrepreneurs having expertise in stitching and tailoring. 89 SHG women started their own entrepreneurship outlets in their respective villages for the marketing of products prepared by SHG women.

Our major campaign this year against domestic violence and substance abuse gathered momentum and garnered the support of 98,006 rural men and women in Varanasi, who assured not to remain spectators, but to raise their voice against abuse and violence. The 'We Ring the Bell' campaign organized in 29 cities in collaboration with 20 like-minded organizations created massive awareness among 41,625 school kids and 5,327 parents advocating for inclusive education of children with disabilities.



COVID-19 RESPONSE

As the nationwide lockdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic affected people, especially the marginalized communities, daily wagers, informal and migrant workers, etc, needed to be helped with immediate support for sustenance. Therefore, JVS, with like-minded social and educational institutions in Varanasi, kick started the relief work campaign on 25th March 2020. We initially began with cooked food and then moved on to dry ration kits, including rice, wheat flour, cooking oil, pulse, salt, potato, onion, biscuits, soap and face mask, costing Rs.600 per kit. Until 03 June 2020, we reached out to 14,853 families, including returnee migrants in Varanasi and Jaunpur districts of Uttar Pradesh. The campaign was financially

supported by hundreds of individuals and organizations from within the country and institutional donors abroad like, Missio München, Germany, Manos Unidas, Spain, Friends and well-wishers from Belfast, N. Ireland, etc. A special word of appreciation to all the volunteers who worked hard packing and distributing relief materials to the needy despite the risk involved. Liliane Foundation, the Netherlands, extended special support to families of persons with disabilities affected by COVID-19. Through this support, we, in partnership with 57 partner organizations in 13 states of North and North East India reached out to 5,478 families of children and youngsters with disabilities.

COMMUNITY-BASED INCLUSIVE DEVELOPMENT



Like in the previous years, our commitment towards ‘rehabilitation’ was as firm as ever; that is why we were able to extend therapeutic, educational and other services to 5,760 children in partnership with 66 NGOs in North and North East India. Being a challenging year for community outreach, we still laid out efficient strategies to ensure timely intervention and rehabilitation for children with disabilities. We also focused our intervention on inclusive education, accessibility, and early detection and intervention – to prevent disabilities.

Given the nation-wide pandemic situation, we used ‘webinars’ to train and guide our network partner organizations for strengthening their knowledge and skills in disability and rehabilitation. We also conducted a survey to identify the gaps and challenges in the rehabilitation process during COVID-19 in terms of educational barriers, health, livelihood and income of the family, and the level of sustenance of the family of children with disabilities on availing/benefiting various services provided by the government & others.

Few remarkable developments that took place during this year are as follows;

- Organized 16 training programs for 877 CBR staff from partner organizations on various topics such as, Early Intervention, RPWD Act 2016, Accessibility, Therapeutic Management, Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR), Management of Neurological Disabilities, Wheelchair Modification, Resource Mobilization, Inclusive Children’s Parliament, etc.
- Development of ‘Divy Sewa’ mobile applications for registration of people with disabilities as well as to link them with government services.



SAFE MOTHERHOOD

Our ‘Safe Motherhood’ team organized a number of health camps, awareness paintings, training programs, and outreach events to ensure better health and hygiene among rural pregnant women, lactating mothers and adolescent girls. Despite the odd field situation owing to the COVID-19 pandemic, we still identified 25 Village Panchayats of Harahua and Baragaon Development Blocks in Varanasi, where we oriented rural women on the

significance of institutional deliveries and health and nutrition. For an effective follow-up, we formed 25 village health committees (VHCs), and guided them on vaccination, and other available government health programs and schemes. Linkages with government healthcare services for easy availability of medical ambulances through 108 helpline number was a new initiative and was greatly appreciated by women in the communities. Through our initiative, 176 pregnant women had their institutional delivery, ensuring greater safety of mother and child. To create mass awareness on safe motherhood, we carried out wall paintings in 85 panchayats in Harahua and Baragaon development blocks in Varanasi. During the year, we organized many training programs, such as, new born child care, health & Hygiene, Sex Education, ambulance service etc. to improve the knowledge and skills of women.

EMPOWERMENT & SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD



Working earnestly to achieve SDG 1 (No Poverty), 5 (Gender Equality) and 8 (Decent Work and Economic Growth) of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) laid by the United Nations (UN), we trained rural women on various themes such as Communications, Marketing, Financial Literacy, Leadership, Problem Solving, Decision Making, etc. We also engaged them in various entrepreneurial activities like

Detergent Production, LED Bulb, Leggings, Nutritional Products, Phenol Making etc. For this purpose, we established 2 Boutiques cum production units, which are small garment making enterprises in Kerakat and Pindra blocks of Jaunpur and Varanasi districts respectively, providing sustainable incomes to tens of women from rural areas. Having named after the acronym of their women's collective 'Mahila Vikas Samiti', these 'MVS' boutiques initially train rural women for a period of 15 days and then provide them with 'paid' sewing and stitching assignments to produce finished products such as women leggings, kurtis, ankle length trousers, etc. A few women were motivated to start their own entrepreneurship outlets within their own villages to market the products prepared by the SHG women. At present, there are 89 such outlets in Pindra and Kerakat development blocks in Varanasi and Jaunpur districts. Three hundred and ninety-four members from our SHGs are engaged in various livelihood productions, such as washing powder, leggings, paper plates, assembling and marketing LED bulbs, sanitary pads, etc. Many of them were strengthened and capacitated through new training sessions this year.

SKILLS FOR INCLUSIVE EMPLOYMENT

Providing skill training to youngsters so they may ensure respectable work opportunities for themselves, we offered skill development courses approved by National Skill Development Council (NSDC) to 26 youngsters from neighboring village communities. A Diploma programme in Computer Applications (DCA) with Tally ERP 9.0 for

basic accounting and GST instilled within these youth a structured knowledge of accounting and taxation, which would gradually help them find suitable opportunities. The additional support of Spoken English and Personality Development boosted their sense of self-confidence to become masters of their destinies. A perfect example is that of 27-year old Shabana Sheikh, who suffered from locomotor disability yet attended each class in her wheelchair to gain ample knowledge so she may stand shoulder to shoulder with her peers. Exposure visits and job fairs helped them get a know-how of the highly competitive corporate world too.



INCLUSIVE EDUCATION

In 2016, a five-year 'RAISE NE' project was initiated to increase participation of children with various disabilities in mainstream schools by training teachers on inclusive education techniques. The project was a joint venture of JVS, CBM India and Light for the World in partnership with 15 NGOs in five North-Eastern states (Assam,

Manipur, Meghalaya, Nagaland, and Tripura). We also completed a similar project in 3 districts of U.P. in partnership with 2 NGOs. The partner NGOs have developed/upgraded their centres as model Resource Centers on Inclusive Education and have promoted accessibility and increased participation and performance of children with disabilities in 12 neighbourhood government primary schools. Teachers are trained to adapt or develop alternative learning materials and teaching aids, as well as to support a variety of disabilities, such as sensory, intellectual, learning, and multiple disabilities. Project also supports schools in obtaining assistive devices and other aids for children through existing government schemes. As the program has formally ended, these NGOs continue to be the resource centres and provide expertise on inclusive education for their respective states.

WASH

Clean water, good health and hygiene are the fundamental rights of everyone. Working earnestly to ensure better health and hygiene among the rural population, we initiated Project 'WASH' three years ago in Durgawati development block, in Kaimur district, Bihar. The project aims to address the secured health and hygiene of adolescent girls and women in the community. Thus, the project ascertains and creates awareness to secure sustainable access to basic sanitation in the Durgawati block of Kaimur District in Bihar.

During the year 2020-21, under the 'WASH,' the following activities were undertaken in the target area.



- 4 Workshops on WASH for 89 PRI members
- 2 Workshops on WASH for 126 members of Village/District Sanitation and Water Committee (VSWC)
- 3 Workshops on WASH for 44 members of the School Management Committee (SMC)
- 2 Workshops on WASH for 25 MGNREGA officers
- 3 Workshops on WASH for 139 members of SHGs/CBOs and Federations
- Community Meetings with 571 Parents, 163 Adolescent Girls and 28 Persons with Disabilities
- Construction and modification of 10 disable-friendly toilets in the individual households
- Construction and modification of 5 disable-friendly toilets in government primary schools

INCLUSIVE CHILDREN'S PARLIAMENT



With the aim of making children the leaders of tomorrow by instilling within them skills of community leadership, we initiated the 'Inclusive Children's Parliament' (ICP). We have a total of 125 Village ICPs and committees at the district and state level. It's an inclusive and democratic body of children, for the children and by the children. These members of the children's parliament take up various issues and concerns of their community in their house sittings and plan out strategies to address the same.

Due to the COVID-19 scenario, not many meetings or training sessions could be held in this regard this year. Yet we reached out to them, orienting and sensitizing them about the pandemic COVID-19 and how to protect themselves from getting infected.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE



It is a fact that even in the 21st century, women face discrimination and violence on different accounts. One of the significant causes of violence against women by the male members of Indian society is excessive use of alcohol or other substances. This leads to depletion of mental and physical health of women and loss of financial well-being of a family. To counter this, JVS made an attempt to create awareness among the rural folk about the ills of excessive alcohol and other substance consumption. A total of 98,006 people, including men, women and

youth in Harahua and Pindra development blocks in Varanasi district, U.P were oriented and encouraged to become catalysts for a domestic violence-free society. Women were oriented about the various provisions and legal remedies under the law, which they can seek to ensure a respectable and dignified life within their families. In this period, we also organized 74 village level awareness meetings in these blocks which helped to lower the rate of cases of domestic violence and substance abuse. A few women collectives in these villages even took a step further and opposed establishment of liquor shops in their vicinity.



SPECIAL EVENTS

Celebrating important days and occasions is an essential part of our culture and ethos. 'Jan Vikas Samiti' strongly believes that such occasions not only unite the masses but are also platforms to raise awareness on various issues in the community.

During the year, we celebrated occasions and events such as World Disability Day, International Women's Day and We Ring the Bell etc. This year, 'We Ring the Bell' campaign was inaugurated by Shri Anil Rajbhar - Minister for Divyangjan Empowerment, State of U.P. on 12th

March 2021 which amplified our message of community empowerment and serving people with disabilities. Cultural events and talent hunts with children with disabilities, rallies with communities of women and advocacy for mainstream inclusive education for children with disabilities are some of the activities we could do during these occasions.



SUCCESS STORY

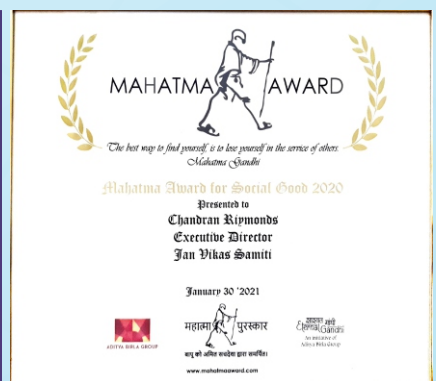
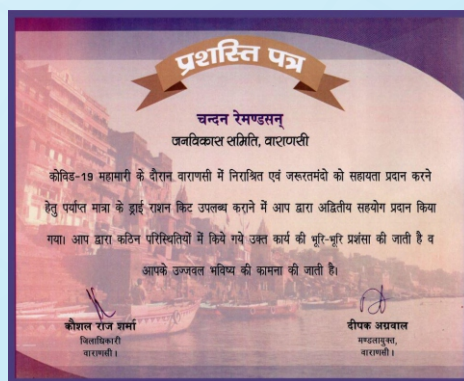
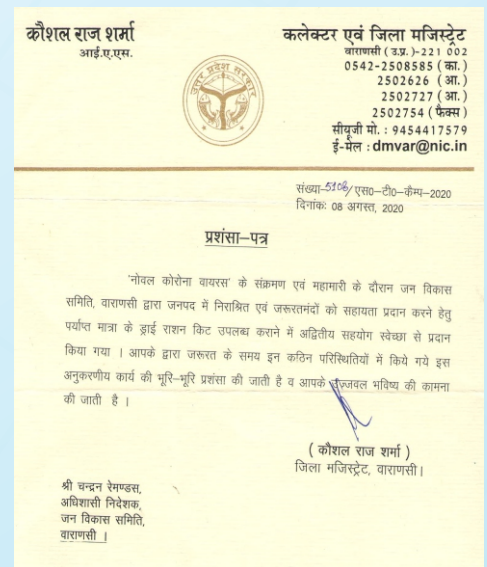
This is the story of 9-year-old Aakrانش, son of Ravindra Kumar and Soni Devi, hailing from Danupur village of Christ Nagar, Varanasi. Aakrانش suffers from Cerebral Palsy with Fits and has communication problem as well. He has three sisters and his Dad Ravindra is a daily wage earner, trying hard each day to feed his family of six.

Aakrانش used to face difficulty in balancing and always fell while trying to walk. He was unable to talk, and therefore used to communicate through gestures and expressions. These disabilities restricted his self-reliance to carry out

even his primary ADL activities. Admitted to 'Muskan Day Care' centre in 2018 by one of our 'Community Based Rehabilitation' (CBR) facilitators, Aakrانش's rehabilitation began with effective physiotherapy, ADL Training and Playful Learning sessions. These practical sessions led to gradual improvement in his movements, communication abilities, ADL activities and IQ. The intensity of 'Fits' was reduced over time as well. Medical Nutrition and Aids & appliances facilities provided by 'Muskan Day Care' helped in Aakrانش's time-bound rehabilitation which has gradually led to his overall growth and development. Furthermore, the organization's frequent medical camps help the parents of kids like Aakrانش get easy consultations for any support regarding assistive devices, medical and educational services keeping in view child's age and physical status.

AWARDS & ACCOLADES

This year was undeniably a tough test of resilience and patience for all of us. With the persistent efforts of our team and the unconditional support of our partners, we continued our services to the communities through our different initiatives. Our efforts were widely appreciated and acknowledged by public and private partners giving us a sense of motivation for continuing our efforts for community welfare.
